

# Words to the Wise

### October | 2022



I took a class in my undergraduate program called "World Religions." The opening scene of the main book we read from was the story of anyone who has ever lifted their eyes to the night sky for the first time. Taking in the vastness of infinite space dotted with billions of enormous burning stars is overwhelming for us all. Inevitably, the Religions book said, we cannot take in the beauty of the night sky without pondering our place and purpose in all of Creation and life. Every person's religious yearning begins with the question of "why?" and "who?" or some variation of these things.

It's no surprise to me that the great redemption story in our Bible begins with God having Abram look up into the night sky. Genesis 15:5 says, "Then [God] brought Abram outside and said, 'Look up at the sky and count the stars if you think you can count them." Such an odd little dare to be a part of the conversation about the future of Abram's family as well as the future of the world itself. "Count the stars...if you think you can count them."

Any one of us would immediately recognize the fallacy of thinking we might even try. But the descendants of Abram are going to match the infiniteness, God says. "Your future will be beyond count...unless, of course, you think you could actually count that high." Abram probably felt like most of us would in the moment when we stare into the darkness of deep space—very small and filled with both humility and awe.

I wonder if we have done a disservice to ourselves by sleeping under roofs and lining our streets with lights. When was the last time you looked up into the sky? If you have recently, then you know that the pull to be humbled and awed never goes away. We cannot help but to let our eyes and hearts be completely captivated by the same night sky Abram peered upon so long ago. As he pondered his future, the light from those same stars produced in that moment has barely traveled 1% of the way to our own eyes (that will blow your mind if you ponder that too long.)

I wonder if the lack of star-gazing has hindered our chance to continue in our growth of faith. If we aren't caught up in the overwhelming beauty and size of it all, might we miss the chance to be humbled and swept up in awe? If we don't have the infinite space against which we can compare ourselves, might we be tempted to imagine ourselves to be much bigger than we really are?

We've all had many moments in our lives when we've confronted the question of our future. These past few years it's felt more like those questions have been the ones confronting us more than we might have liked. Nevertheless...here we are...pondering into the vastness of possibilities of our future. Here we are presented with the opportunity to discern together. Perhaps sleeping in our own separate four walls has limited us by obstructing our understanding of one another every bit as much as having those roofs has obstructed our view and lesson of the heavens.

We are standing here together looking into the great unknown of tomorrow...and next year...and next decade...and next century. We have come a long way, SUMC. Thinking back on all that has been witnessed in the existence of our congregation is almost equally overwhelming as looking up. "Why are we here in Sellersburg?" and "Who is God calling US to be TODAY?" are questions still worth pondering. Left on our own, the

World Religions book said, we tend to develop our own answers forming our own versions of religion. But... together,... discerning,... sharing,... connecting,... listening,... and making a real effort to understand one another's perspective on the deep and foundational questions about our purpose and identity here and now... we just might, once again, be humbled and awed at the work God has placed before us.

I know it's easier to look behind us on our journey and relish in the places we've been and the way things were. It's just as easy to lay in our beds in our four walls under our roofs and get our sleep each night quietly and undisturbed. I know we might actually think ourselves so big that we could actually count the stars as Abram might have at that moment.


I pray that God calls us out of our comfort and protection. I pray that we boldly and bravely step out into the unknown night together. I pray that we stand side by side and look up to be humbled and awed as one body of people journeying in this faith together. I pray that we seize this opportunity to embrace the possibilities before us...like Abram and Sarai did. Because...they could have stayed in Haran and chosen familiarity and security over faith and growth. They could've said "No thanks, God. We like things the way they are."

I'm so glad they placed their faith in God to lead them on a journey they could have never imagined on their own. As a group of those descendants God promised Abram millenia ago, we have the choice to stay in the Haran of our past... or place our faith in God to lead us to the future of promise beyond our wildest imaginations or ability to comprehend or count. As you consider your own response to the invitation of faith today, take some time to look around at your people on Sunday morning... go outside and stare at the night sky. May we all make it a

point to be humbled and awed by the goodness of God's great and glorious future for us all.

Incredibly, we are entering the final stretch of 2022! As the leaves are changing colors and we pull out the lightweight jackets, I want to ask you to take a moment to appreciate the beauty of creation around you. Far too often, we get in the daily grind—our routine—and fail to stop to appreciate the majestic nature of our Lord and the daily blessings delivered to us.

# Financial Update August 2022

Below is the SUMC financial report for August, 2022:

### Income Comparison 2021 vs. 2022

Income for first 35 Weeks in 2022 (through 31Aug22): \$157,989.05
Income for first 35 Weeks in 2021 (through 29Aug21): \$172,850.13

Difference: \$ -14,861.08

As shown above, the giving for 2022 continues to track below the giving for 2021.

### Projected Giving to End of 2022 at Current Rate of Giving

Income: \$157,989.05 Weeks: 35

Average Giving Per Week: \$ 4,513.97

Projection to Years End (52 weeks): \$234,726.59

### Income versus Expenses through end of August:

The Income versus Expenses Report for August is not yet available; however, Expenses exceeded Income through the end of <u>July</u> by nearly \$ 11,000.

The church remains current in their obligations to the United Methodist Church. All other bills are also current.

The Pig Roast Committee has decided to direct the proceeds from the recent 2022 Pig Roast of approximately \$ 4,200 to the General Fund. This will help off-set the current deficit where Expenses exceed Income. The funding from the Pig Roast is not included in the above totals.
