# Pastor's Pen...

We are now in the middle of the season of Lent. If you have not been around or are still wrapping your head around what Lent means, let me help. At its basic level, it is simply a period of time including the 6 Sundays leading up to Easter. Because Easter moves from year to year, Lent moves as well. Lent is 40 days long. This is based on the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness being tempted. However, Lent is actually 40 days out of 46 days before Easter. Now did that make it more confusing? The 6 Sundays within Lent do NOT count as part of Lent. So when you back up 46 days before Easter Sunday that turns out to be a Wednesday. (NOTE: On Leap Years, like this one, there are 47 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday. Perhaps every 4 years, we should have Ash Thursday.)

As I mentioned, the 40 (41) days that are not Sundays are based on the 40 days that Jesus was in the wilderness being tempted. During that time, Jesus fasted. For that reason, it is common for Christians observing Lent to also fast during this time. Fasting is probably the thing that most people think of when they think of Lent. However, Lent has also been a time of preparing new members by teaching the basics of faith. We are doing all of this. Please see the February Newsletter for a lot more information about fasting, including some positive ways of fasting that can help you grow closer to God.

Now that we are in Lent, we have started several classes about the basics of faith. The Friday

Morning Bible Study is studying the work and faith of John Wesley. In this study, we are looking at the beliefs and practices that started the Methodist movement in the world. Janet Werele and her Sunday school class in room 2 are studying the problem of good and evil, a very basic part of our Christian beliefs and how we see God in the world around us. On Wednesday evenings, we have added a special Lenten study about the basics of Christianity from the unique perspective of United Methodists. All of these classes are wonderful ways of living out the full meaning and purpose of Lent.








#### **SPECIAL EVENING LENTEN STUDY SERIES**



#### **HOLY THURSDAY and GOOD FRIDAY SERVICES**

It begins with Palm Sunday and each of these days commemorate a specific event or series of events from the final days of Jesus life, and his crucifixion. Even more exciting, we will be worshiping along with several local United Methodist Churches in our River Ridge Cluster group.

Everyone is searching for something in their lives. This Easter, we will show how the Good News of the resurrection connects with the things we most desperately need in our lives like hope, peace, connection, and love. God's gift of life everlasting is truly one of the most wondrous gifts of grace. What love it is to offer that which soothes that fundamentally mortal fear: that being to die. The 1780 hymn And Am I Born To Die by Charles Wesley, also commonly referred to as Idumea after the 1816 tune by Ananias Davisson that is often sung to, plays on that fear, asking the question of what will become of one's soul after death.

The question is that of whether one's soul is doomed to die as their body must. "And must my trembling spirit fly, into a world unknown" is one such line. The place where the dead descend, wholly unknowable to a living man, is a great terror on the heart of the unsure. But the question is answered and a song of fear becomes one of hope and resolution in faith. The final verse beseeches the Lord to show the way to shun wrath and know Him at the end of life. It echoes a sentiment often shown in psalms and hymns, that despite our mortal fears and doubts God knows these things and freely gives us a shield of love and a place at His heavenly table.

# Holy Week Services The River Ridge Cluster was formed in 2010 with 9

Clark County UMC Churches working together to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ in various ways in our collective communities. Currently the active members are from the congregations of Emmanuel, Vienna, Old Capital, Pleasant Grove, St. James, Memphis, Utica and Sellersburg United Methodist Churches. For several years we worked a booth at the Clark County 4-H Fair in Charlestown. Many Christian themed coloring books, crayons, Teen Bibles and bottles of water were given to children, teens and their families during the five days of the fair. We have hosted a week of services when each night the service was in a different church with spirited preaching and lively music. The most well-attended services have been the joint Holy Week Services of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Sellersburg UMC has always hosted due to the size of the sanctuary. This year Maundy Thursday will be a service of reflection as we commemorate the Last Supper of Jesus with his disciples. There will be music and scripture readings of the last hours with Jesus and his followers before he is arrested. We will hear about the stirring events that took place before he walked to the cross and we will be reminded of God's great love for each of us. The Good Friday worship will be in the order of a Tenebrae service when after each scripture reading, a candle will be snuffed until all is

finished and we leave in darkness and solemn

silence. There will be a combined choir singing the Via Dolorosa translated as "The Way of Sorrow" as we are reminded of the path Christ took through Jerusalem to the Cross of Crucifixion.

Please plan to join us for these meaningful services of remembrance and introspection as God's love for all is proclaimed from the cross on which Jesus bore our sin. Maundy Thursday is on March 28, and Good Friday is on March 29; both services begin at 7:00, Sellersburg United Methodist Church.
