Words to the Wise

Taking in the Moment

Luke 2:19 - ...and Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart.

This is one of the most interesting verses in our biblical narrative of the birth of Jesus. I know the song by Mark Lowry has become one of much conversation/controversy. Mark meant well when he composed his song, but we can be assured that "YES, Mark, Mary knew much more than any of us can comprehend." While it's quite trendy to share our opinions concerning just about anything, we could all use a lesson from the very first believer on the planet Earth. (If you want to continue to like the song, "Mary, Did You Know?" please do so with no regrets. If you want to challenge the song, there is much to be affirmed from this perspective, too. As John Wesley said, "Think and let think.")

But let's get back to the scripture, shall we? Mary has been through an incredible ordeal in her early teenage years. While most of us were/are dealing with the rules of our parents/guardians and whether we were being accepted by the right people in school... Mary was processing her encounter with Gabriel (God's messenger/angel), an untimely pregnancy, anticipating the meaning of her son-to-be, and managing the physical, emotional, spiritual, and mental demands of growing a human being in her body.

Once she's had her message confirmed by her once barren cousin (or aunt?), Elizabeth, and then managed to help her betrothed, Joseph, reconcile what was happening, she then journeys on a donkey from Nazareth to Bethlehem late in her pregnancy. (If we read the Matthew story, she was already in Bethlehem...but that's beside the point) Then, there was no room in the guest quarters of whomever they were staying with, so she's had to quickly make a home out of a room next to the animals and then, oh yeah, BIRTH A SON! To top it all off, a crowd of shepherds arrive on the scene.

Now...you may not know this about shepherds, but they were not the most accepted group of people. In fact, it's widely known that shepherding was reserved for the outcasts of the community. If a person was to commit some kind of act of particular disgust, they would be relegated to the work of shepherding. This accomplished a few goals: 1. Somebody had to do it, 2. That someone who would then spend their days sweating and stinking would not be someone of reputation, and 3. If said individual was entering a town, everyone would be warned of exactly what type of person they were long before they got close because of the smell of sheep upon them.

Knowing this about shepherding makes it all the more interesting that the host (army) of angels appeared to **them** out in the fields over any other group of people. The shepherds were the ones who were sent to find Jesus and tell the news to the community about what had happened. In a way, this makes perfect sense considering the way the Gospel of Luke tells the story of Jesus.

The tired, depleted, sensitive, protective, and vulnerable Mary has her early hours with her brand new son interrupted by the presence of a bunch of smelly and disreputable shepherds; they have come to see and honor her son. They tell her of what happened in the night as they dwelt under the stars with their sheep. They tell the whole community, in fact, and amaze everyone. ...and Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart.

Mary, in her incredible wisdom, chooses a silent reflection in response to the miraculous and beautiful chaos of the evening's events. She treasured and pondered the words. What I wouldn't give to have been there in that moment to ask Mary, "What do you know?" I'm confident

she would have much to share with us all...eventually.

Perhaps she did not know what to make of the evening in the moment. Perhaps she needed to spend time in prayerful meditation and thought to discern all that she was a part of...all that was happening in and through her and her new son...all that would come to be through her newly forming family. How could anyone wrap their head around it on top of everything else she needed to focus on right then? Mary possessed a strength few could ever understand.

Patience, silence, pondering, and treasuring are such remarkable responses to the movement of God in her life. We would all do well to follow suit no matter what we are facing today. Whether we do this as individuals, as a family, as a church body, or as a community/nation... taking more time to think (and let think) is NEVER a bad idea. How much better off would we be if being "quick to think and slow to speak" were our go-to response to life?

Let's begin a routine of this type of response this Christmas season. Let's take time to soak up each and every moment. If you're with a family member, or a whole crew of relatives, take time during your gathering to just ponder and take it all in. Stop, sit down, and look around. Notice who is there and what they are wearing. Notice their facial expressions. Close your eyes and take in the sounds. Breathe deeply and process the array of aromas. Focus on what you feel in the moment: the chair you are sitting in, the warmth/cool of the air in the room, or the softness/roughness of your ugly Christmas sweater against your skin. Take time to savor your food as you eat: consider the texture, the flavor, the temperature, and whatever else you might discover. Be sure to treasure the moments and ponder them in your heart. Take it all in and be fully present to the moment and all of the joy and wisdom it offers.

Let's continue with the spiritual routines of the Christmas season. Prayerfully reflect on the meaning of light during this season; there is a reason Christmas was set, originally, for the moment when the nights stopped growing longer and began to grow shorter (12/22). Consider why HOPE, PEACE, JOY, and LOVE are the preceding candles before we light the CHRIST candle on Christmas Eve. Why these words and not others? Where are you finding these themes in the story? Where are you finding them in your own celebrations?

However you come to celebrate Christmas Day and the New Year, may they be blessed and joyful. May they be treasured and pondered. May they become the source of a new birth in your own heart. May they become the source of new life and meaning for our church body as we

continue the story in all that we say, in all that we do, and in all that we are for our community and mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

May we be "quick to think and slow to speak" for a change so that we might take in the moment and come to receive the wisdom of a young teenage Nazarene whose obedience and faith changed the world forever.

As we consider the new year, many people are making resolutions that will invariably become overwhelmingly challenging, some before February even hits the calendars and others later. Countless people resolve to lose weight, to read more, to get their spending under control, or to undertake some other Herculean feat.

I will not speak for everyone who has attempted to hold onto these resolutions, but from my own experiences, I admit that the grander the resolution, the less likely the desired outcome tends to be. I suspect that most readers can empathize with this sentiment and know where I am coming from. If you can't and you don't, please come see me in a few months.

It's from this perspective and mindset that I want to present the underlying reason for my article this month. I want to ask you to look inward at where else you might be giving up prematurely with respect to the family and kingdom of God!

As a worship leader and music director, I am privileged to be a part of many ministries within the church. I see the various ministries of the church helping people and glorifying God. I witness many of the eager participants who serve across countless areas of the church. At the same time, however, I often see empty pews and sparsely filled sign up sheets. For all of the amazing volunteers and servants I witness each week,

it is apparent how many opportunities go unnoticed and unfulfilled.

I want to take a moment to highlight just a few of the many amazing areas needing volunteers within our church. I certainly do not want to look lightly on or take for granted those who dutifully and faithfully serve already, whether in these ministries or elsewhere. Instead, I want to shed light on places that God may be calling you to serve in, too.

I ask that whatever you do and however you serve, that you sincerely pray for God to reveal God's will to you. You may be surprised when after prayerful consideration you receive an answer.

Welcome Team

 We need greeters and ushers to welcome our brothers and sisters as well as assist with elements of worship. This includes things like turning on lights, making coffee, setting out food for fellowship, and placing our "Welcome!" flags outside. We have multiple services on Sundays, so there will almost always be needs in this area.

Tech Booth

 We need help running the sound board and slides on Sunday mornings. Since we offer services at multiple times on Sundays, the needs are great in this ministry. Fortunately, the work is not heavy and our team provides the simple training needed to serve.

Liturgists

 Each month our church rotates a team of readers for each service to welcome our church and make announcements, lead the church's call to worship, and other liturgical readings. All of the scripts are pre-printed and provided with ample time to practice before Sunday services. However, each liturgist is welcome to make their own edits to add their own voice to the readings as they feel called. As described before, there are multiple Sunday services, which requires multiple readers each week.

Creative Worship Team

• Every quarter a team of people invested in worship will gather to discuss how to better define and meet our goals in worship. We discuss creative ways to engage the church as we consider activities and reflect on seasons and services. From the decorations and visual aids to the actual elements of worship, this team meets only four times a year, but contributes greatly to the worship environment.

Music Ministries

- Our sanctuary choir is composed of men and women from all ages and musical backgrounds.
 We joyfully sing each week on Wednesdays at 5:30pm as we fellowship & rehearse, and on Sundays as we lead worship for the 9:00am service.
- Our praise team meets each Wednesday after choir rehearsal (usually 6:30p) to rehearse the songs we lead for worship on Sunday mornings at 9:00a and 11:00a. We have vocalists and instrumentalists. In particular we have a need for a percussionist. The church even owns a "cajón," which is the name of the instrument that you sit atop and tap. It is named after the very box that it resembles

Fortunately, for all of these opportunities, you do not need any background or experience to serve. You simply must have the willingness and desire to serve with a heart of worship and be eager to glorify God.

Do not look at this list of opportunities as a list of resolutions— just a box for you to tick or a feat that you can accomplish. Instead, consider the words of a

wonderfully pointed prayer in the worship song "Change My Heart O God" when you ask God to mold and shape your life for God's glory. Ask the Lord to lead, guide, and direct your life throughout this new year, and pray for God's will to be revealed.

Who knows? Maybe you will be called to serve in one of these positions. Maybe God will call you to serve in an unsung capacity, where no one will ever know that you did something special. Whatever the result, please prayerfully do all things for God's honor and glory.
