Pastor's Pen...

June is always a busy month for me. I will be attending 2 Annual Conference Sessions. The first week of June, I will be in Indianapolis attending the Indiana Conference along with Janet Werle, Pastor Gary, and others. The 2nd week, I will be attending the California-Pacific Annual Conference in Palm Springs.

There is a lot of talk about the Annual Conferences this year. That is because last year at the worldwide United Methodist meeting called General Conference, they passed 4 different Constitutional Amendments. The Methodist church was formed about the same time as the United States Government. Because of that, they are set up in similar ways. One similarity is that they both have a constitution. Ours contains the main rules and beliefs about what it means to be a United Methodist. Changing these rules, like the US Constitution, requires more than just a simple vote.

To change the United Methodist Constitution, every Annual Conference around the world will vote on the 4 amendments. They will then tally all of the votes from every single Annual Conference and come up with the total number of yes votes versus the total number of no votes. If the percentage of yes votes is high enough, then the amendment passes and becomes part of the constitution. It takes a long time for all of the different Annual Conferences to meet and vote. That means that they will not know whether any of them passed until likely sometime in 2026.

You may be wondering what is in the constitutional amendments. There are 4, but the

main amendment revolves around something called "Regionalization." Methodism started in the United States, but in the last 50 or so years it has grown very quickly in places like Asia and Africa. In order to give these new regions some flexibility, they were allowed to make changes to the general rules, what we call the Discipline, that only affected their particular region. What this meant was that while delegates from around the world voted on the rules for the US, only members from the African regions got to vote on the specific rules for Africa and the same for Asia.

The "Regionalization" amendment seeks to even the playing field by making the US a region equal to Africa, Asia, and others. This way, each Region, including the US, could make some changes to the Discipline without affecting the other regions. This would allow more flexibility for each Region to address their cultural and sometimes legal realities without impinging on other Regions. The downside is that there would be multiple different Disciplines around the world. The upside is that people of different lands, histories, and cultures, will be able to live together under one umbrella called The United Methodist Church.

There will be a special Webinar presentation on Wednesday evening, May 28th at 7pm. All are invited to Room 2 to watch this webinar together and learn more about all of the Constitutional Amendments.

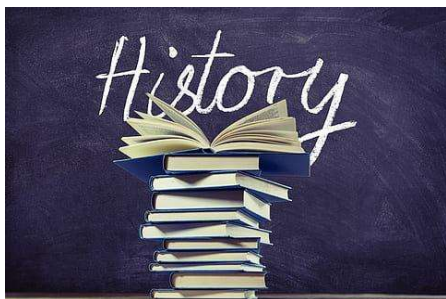
WEDNESDAY & FRIDAY BIBLE STUDY

We are having our next gathering of the Prayer Quilt Ministry team on Monday, June 2nd, at 6:00 pm in Room 2 in the church basement (enter through the back door of the church off of the parking lot). We are looking for anyone who wants to help with this budding ministry whether they attend our church or not. Helping can be as simple as threading on the prayer ties, cutting up fabric, or fringing fleece among other tasks. We will also gladly accept finished lap quilts (around 3' by 4') or prayer squares (12" by 12") and we will add the ties. In addition, we are accepting donations of:

- Any cotton, fleece, or blended fabric (including any size scraps or even quilt tops if you have one laying around you will never finish)
- Embroidery floss, yarn, or pearl crochet cotton for prayer ties
- Used or new flannel back tablecloths to cover the work tables
- Well-loved or new fabric scissors
- Monetary donations for us to buy any of the above are also accepted (write Prayer Quilt Ministry in the memo section of the check or the offering envelope)

Prayer Quilts can be requested by anyone for anyone, whether they attend our church or not. The quilts are gifts from the church to the recipients—they are all about the prayers that are attached to them. There are forms in the entryway by the Fellowship Hall on the table in the brown folder. 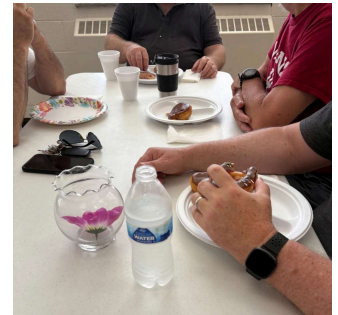

COMMUNITY NEEDS

Silver Creek Food Pantry

First off, thank you so much for your generosity so far this year! The Missions Team still needs your help with donations for Silver Creek Food Pantry and Exit 0. As summer approaches, the Silver Creek Food Pantry will be accessible to students throughout the summer months. Many families do not have the means to supply 3 meals a day or those everyday toiletries. Here is a list of especially needed items:

Pasta – Pasta sauce – Kraft Mac-n-cheese (Easy Mac as well) – Peanut Butter (all types) –

Feminine hygiene products – Deodorant (all types)

There is a donation container for this charity in the entry hall between the Fellowship Hall and Sanctuary.

Exit 0

For Exit 0, we need supplies for the Snack Bags and toiletries. Here are the lists as a refresher:

Snack Bags:

The following items are needed for each snack bag:

A gallon size plastic bag – 1 can of meat (Tuna or chicken salad kits, potted meat, Spam, Vienna Sausage – pop top cans) – 1 granola breakfast bar – 1 bottle of water – 1 flavored drink packet – 1 Pop Tart (Donuts, Little Debbie's, Snack Cakes, etc.) – 1 Slim Jim – 1 Variety Snack Bag (Chips, Gold Fish, Cheese Nips, Pretzels, etc.) – 1 Peanut Butter Cracker or Cheese Cracker packet – 1 Fruit Cup including plastic spoon or fork – 5 pieces of wrapped hard candy – 1 Pair of socks

Hygiene Products:

While we are no longer making bags or kits of Hygiene products, we are still collecting the items and delivering them in bulk. Here are some of the products that they need:

Wash Rags – Body Wash (2 in 1) – Bars of soap – Deodorant – Disposable Razors, Q Tips – Tampons/Pads – Toothbrushes – Toothpaste – Combs – Pairs of Socks – Travel size Lotion – Travel size Hand Sanitizer – Travel size First Aid Kits

In the Fellowship Hall, there are totes labeled Snack Bags and Hygiene Bags in which people can drop their donated items or the bags which

they have assembled. You can buy one thing or lots of things. Every little bit helps the homeless Exit 0 serves. When we have enough finished bags to fill boxes, they will be delivered to Exit 0 for distribution. This will be an ongoing mission project for 2025, so donations will be needed all year.

But the generosity of our congregation allowed us to make 50 bags. We used all the supplies and now need to rebuild our donations. We hope to make this a yearlong mission project. Please continue to donate needed items as you can. The assembled bags were delivered to Exit 0, on West Maple Street Baptist Church in Jeff. The people there were very appreciative of the donations.

The mission team has decided to provide the 5th Sunday of the month meals to Exit 0 for the remainder of 2025. SUMC will deliver and serve the Sunday afternoon meal at the shelter. Our first meal will be on Sunday, June 29 at 2:00 pm. We need volunteers to cook, assemble, deliver, and serve the meals at the shelter. If you are interested in helping this mission project, please let Pastor John or Janet Sims know. We will also provide meals in August and November on the last Sundays of these months.

On July 3rd the director of Exit 0, Paul Stensrud will attend and talk to YAH attendees about his project. He will tell us about their work with the homeless in Clark County and their needs. We invite everyone interested in this mission to attend this luncheon and talk. We invite anyone who would like to support this mission project to join us on Wednesday, June 4th for hands-on involvement. Please continue to contribute snack items or hygiene items. There is a table in Fellowship Hall with totes for the collection of any donated items.

Since we started this project in March, we have delivered 150 bags and a large amount of hygiene products. SUMC continues to show Christ's love to people in our community!

A Century of Faith: Celebrating Sellersburg United Methodist Church

This year marks a significant milestone in the life of Sellersburg United Methodist Church as we celebrate the 100th anniversary of our sanctuary—a testament to generations of faith, fellowship, and service.

Our Beginnings

Sellersburg UMC was established in 1871 as the Sellersburg Methodist Episcopal Church, beginning with just eleven charter members under the leadership of Rev. John Green. The original church building was completed and dedicated on August 25, 1882, becoming a central place of worship and community in the growing town of Sellersburg.

A New Sanctuary for a New Century

As the congregation grew, so did the need for a larger space. Construction of our current sanctuary began in June 1924 and was completed in the spring of 1925. The first worship service in the new building was held on May 17, 1925, and for the past 100 years, it has remained a place where faith is nurtured and God is glorified.

Throughout its history, Sellersburg United Methodist Church has been a cornerstone in the community—offering Sunday worship, Christian education, missions, music, youth ministry, and support to families and individuals. Our story is one of
